FACULTY/STAFF NEWS:

Jeff Browne attended the AEJMC Scholastic Journalism Division Mid-Winter Meeting in St. Petersburg, Fla., and was named Vice Head of the Division, effective in August 2013 at the Washington, D.C., conference. Two years as Vice Head, then two years as Head of the Division.

He also presented a session on Hazelwood's impact on university student media and in the classroom, 25 years after the Supreme Court decision in *Hazelwood v. Kuhlmeier*.

Hyunjin Seo's Social Media in Strategic Communication class (JOUR615) has been selected for the Salesforce Marketing Cloud Higher Education Program. This program will allow students in the class opportunities to use Salesforce social media analytics platforms throughout the semester and to interact with Salesforce analysts.

Doug Ward's proposal on using an iPad for grading and student feedback has been accepted for presentation at the Journalism Interactive Teach-a-Thon in Gainesville, Fla., in February.

Ward is one of three faculty members featured on the website of the Center for Online and Distance Learning. In the featured video, he gives a tour of a hybrid course. In another video, he speaks about teaching online. His article "Socratic Method and Online Teaching" was published on the [site](#) in the fall.

On Wednesday, Ward will speak via Skype to students at Franklin College in Indiana about using iPads in education.

Peggy Kuhr has been named the vice president for integrated communications at the University of Montana. Kuhr was appointed interim vice president in August 2012. Before this appointment, she served as dean of the School of Journalism beginning in August 2007. She had a 26-year career in newspapers before joining the University of Kansas in 2002 as Knight Chair on the Press, Leadership and Community.

Jimmy Gentry conducted two days of instruction in analyzing financial statements for business journalists attending the Donald W. Reynolds National Center for Business Journalism's "[Reynolds Week](#)" program at Arizona State University on Jan. 2 – 5. He also conducted a day-long session for journalism educators on teaching financial literacy, business journalism and strategic approaches to teaching a class.

As part of "Reynolds Week," KU graduate **Alison Young** and USA Today colleague **Peter Eisler** received the silver presentation in the Reynolds Center's Barlett and Steele Awards competition for Investigative Business Journalism. Their series, entitled "Ghost Factories," involved a 14-month investigation that revealed locations of more than 230 long-forgotten lead smelters and the poisonous lead they left behind. Reporters used handheld X-ray devices to collect and test 1,000 soil samples to prove there was a serious threat to children living in dozens of neighborhoods. Young also shot photos and video for the package.

Young, who received her KU degree, is a reporter on USA Today's investigative team and serves on the board of directors of Investigative Reporters and Editors, a national journalism-training organization.

The awards are named after Pulitzer Prize winning investigative journalists **Don Barlett** and **Jim Steele**. Steele, who presented the awards, will visit KU on March 5 and 6 to speak at the journalism school and to make public presentation.

David Guth is receiving a sabbatical for the Fall 2014 semester to conduct research on the role of journalism in areas of declining population, such as Western Kansas and Eastern Colorado. His goal is to generate a book and some journal articles from this research.
