### **Course overview**

This course continues the instruction learned in J-210 and prepares students to work independently with multiple sports media – studio and live production. This is a lab-intensive course designed with live studio and live in-the-field productions. Students will have the opportunity to learn behind the scene skills; studio and live camera, floor directing, lighting, audio, basic editing and field producing skills in production of sports media. Advanced students will have the opportunity to learn how to use the TriCaster.

### **Course goals**

- Develop advanced understanding and skills in sports media production
- Operate television production equipment in the studio and in the field
- Receive experience in developing live and taped programming for KUJH-TV, Media Crossroads, and KU Athletics
- Understand the professional standard in sports media production
- Become involved in student media and video production

### **After successfully completing this course you will be able to:**

- Assist in producing live & taped programs for KUJH-TV & Media Crossroads
- Floor direct, operate a camera, understand basics of lighting and audio
- Crew for KU Athletics and other sports media production units
- Write and edit broadcast scripts for local sports
- Use Final Cut Pro or Adobe Premiere to edit original and existing video
- Initiate and develop video projects for the School of Journalism

### **The work**

During Friday class meeting times, we will discuss examples of sports media and video production, as well as practice elements that will enhance students' skill-sets. We will also review weekly shifts and production work. Weekly topics are included below under the "Schedule."

Students will work the equivalent of two hours per week outside of normal meeting times in various sports media production situations. Students will assist in sports production, which may include the following:

operating cameras	editing a sports package/video
set up & tear down of cameras	creating a sports graphic
audio and video editing	recording a press conference
posting to a Website	covering HS football/basketball
directing with TriCaster	other duties as assigned

\*Each week, students will submit a one-page weekly report of their work to include:

- Shifts worked
- Role in the production (camera, audio, etc.)
- Reflection on new skills learned and how they were used in the field
- IF YOU DO NOT SUBMIT A WEEKLY REPORT, YOU WILL GET NO CREDIT!

### **Attendance**

When you have signed up for a live-production, it is a professional commitment and should not be taken lightly. Do not be late and never fail to show up for work. Emergencies happen; therefore, you should always have the contact number of your producer so you can let them know your status.

We will not meet every Friday as a group, but when we do have something scheduled, especially a tour of a production truck or a guest speaker, I expect you to be in attendance.

## Journalism School Policy on Classroom Attendance

No student may add a journalism class after the 20th day of a semester.

Students must attend their classes and laboratory periods. Instructors may take attendance into account in assessing a student's performance and may require a certain level of attendance for passing a course. Instructors may choose to drop students from a course, based on attendance, without consent.

The School of Journalism reserves the right to cancel the enrollment of students who fail to attend the first class or laboratory meeting.

The KU Office of Student Financial Aid is required by federal law to determine whether students who receive aid are attending each class in which they are enrolled.
