

Faculty and staff news

Associate Professor Jerry Crawford has been elected to a three-year term on the Faculty Senate. Faculty Senate members serve simultaneous terms on the University Senate. Crawford's term begins officially May 15, 2017.

Assistant Professor Jonathan Peters published a Columbia Journalism Review <u>column</u> last week about a FOIA request he sent to the Federal Communications Commission asking for all consumer complaints submitted since Oct. 1, 2016, containing the phrase "fake news." Harvard's

Nieman Lab wrote about the column in a <u>story</u> it ran about fake news, and The Verge summarized the column in a <u>story</u> of its own. This week, Peters will speak briefly at 7 p.m. April 25 at Spooner Hall at the event "Free Speech on a University Campus." He will respond to the remarks made by speakers from outside the KU community, including **Frank LoMonte**, director of the Student Press Law Center, and **Susan Kruth**, senior program officer of the Foundation for Individual Rights in Education.

Congratulations to graduate student **Alberto Araujo**, who was part of a team of journalists that won a Pulitzer Prize for the Panama Papers investigation. A consortium of more than 300 journalists conducted a yearlong investigation that exposed the hidden infrastructure and global scale of offshore tax havens. While working in Ecuador last year, Araujo wrote an article about the Chinese company CWE that was building a hydroelectric plant there and was accused of tax evasion. He also wrote about corruption in the biggest state oil company in Ecuador. Read more here.

Faculty members are leading fact-checking boot camps to share tips for evaluating and verifying news sources in a four-part series at the Lawrence Public Library. All sessions will be 6:30-8 p.m. in Library Meeting Room C:

- April 25: Learn the telltale signs of news that may not be factually sound and about the online resources you can use to verify news stories.
- May 2: Uncover the ins and outs of filing requests for public documents under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) and Kansas Open Records Act (KORA).
- May 9: Follow the money in campaign and other political financing by learning about campaign finance laws and searching public records.

JTech Tips: Presentation issues

Helpful hints and suggestions from **Heather Lawrenz** to make your tech life at the J-School go even smoother.

This week's tip:

If you are struggling to get your presentation to project properly, here are the steps we use to make sure things are running.



- 1. Is everything on? (Seems basic, but always start here)
- If you are using consoles (Rooms 204, 206) is it set to the device you are using (laptop or PC)? Check the cabinet and make sure that the dial is set to console (or wall if you are using the wall cable).
- 3. If you are in the Clarkson Gallery, make sure you have set it to project to the correct output HDMI or VGA.
- 4. Make sure the connection from the cable to the device is secure. With a VGA adapter, make sure both connections are tight. (If you see green, this is your issue). Sometimes just reseating that connection will help.
- 5. Have you told your computer to mirror displays? Go to Apple/System Preferences/Displays and check this.
- 6. Everything is displaying but you don't like how it looks? In the same displays dialog, make sure that it is set to VGA display (not IMAC) and you can scale it from there if needed.
